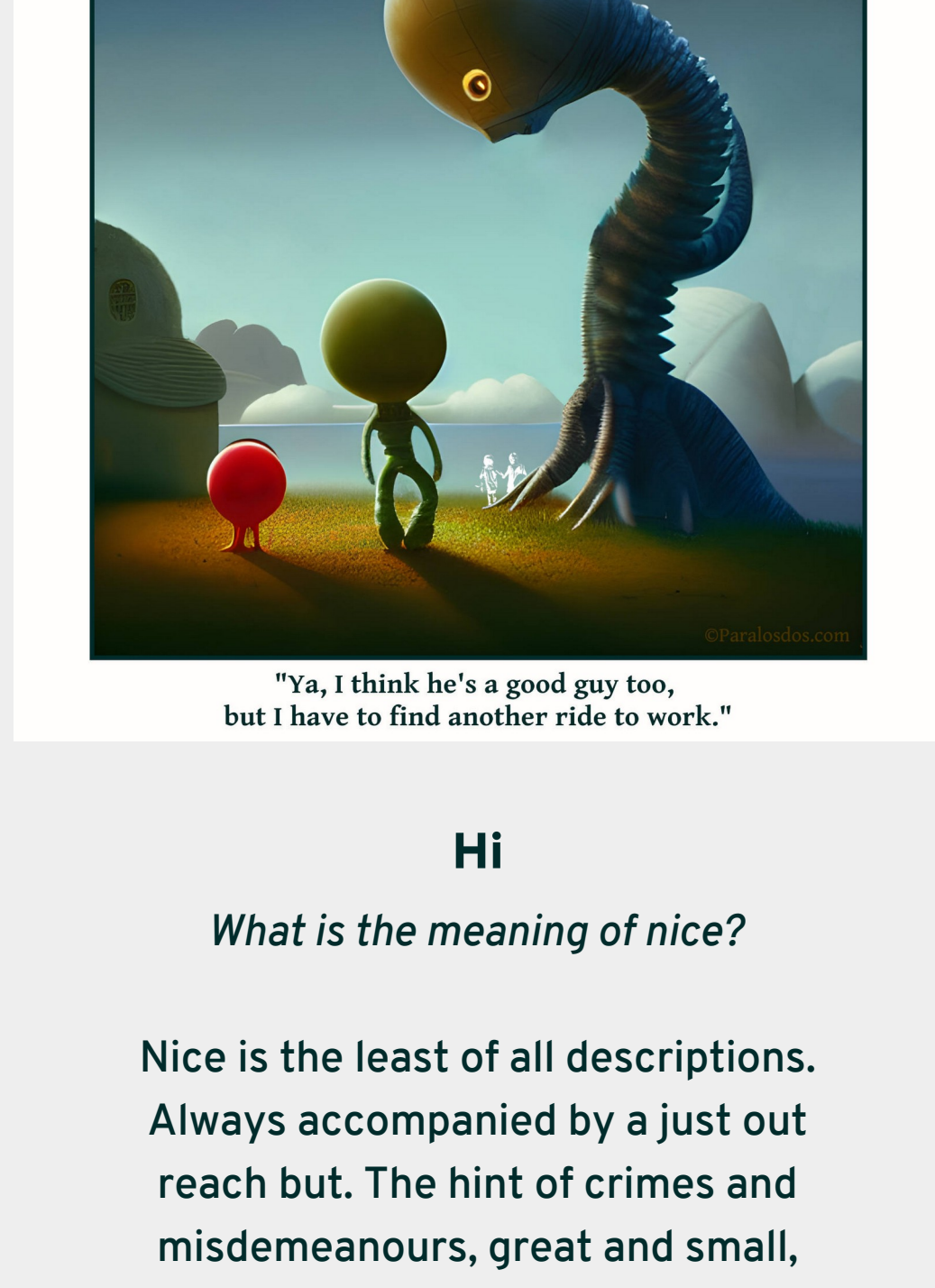

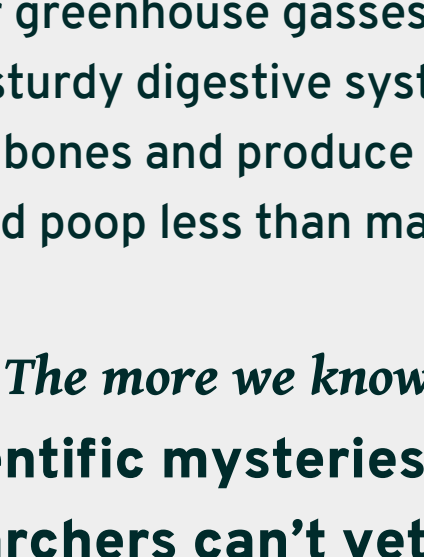
What is the meaning of nice?

" Since they grew so quickly on smaller amounts of food, they had a good feed conversion ratio. In farming, feed conversion is the amount of animal feed that is needed to produce one pound of meat.

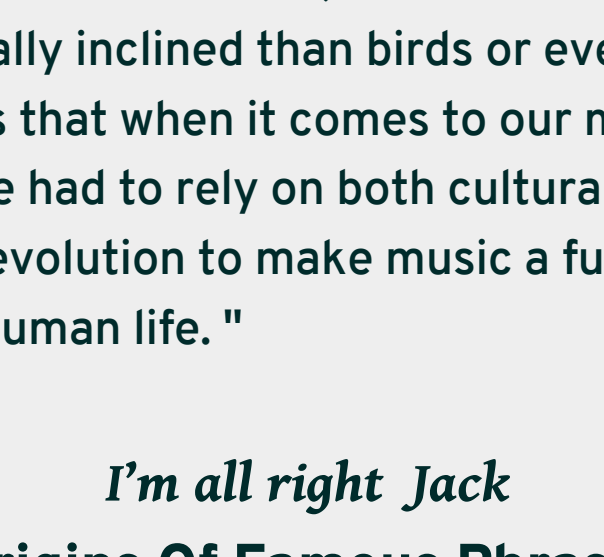
" Recreational camping first became trendy in the late 1800s, popularized by the exploits of naturalist John Muir, who wrote extensively during his years living in Yosemite beginning in 1868. Remarkably, this was only twenty years or so after troubled wagon trains languished in barren deserts or frozen winter climes on their journey to the frontier (think Donner Party). Civilization was barely established in the western U.S. when 'citizens were already seeking a respite from it,' observes U.C. Berkeley librarian and author Susan Snyder in her book Past Tents: The Way We Camped. "

" Their screening of a single film on for around 200 members of the Society for the Development of the National Industry in Paris was probably the first presentation of projected film. Either the techniques or the business models of earlier filmmakers proved to be less viable than the breakthrough presentations of the Lumières. "

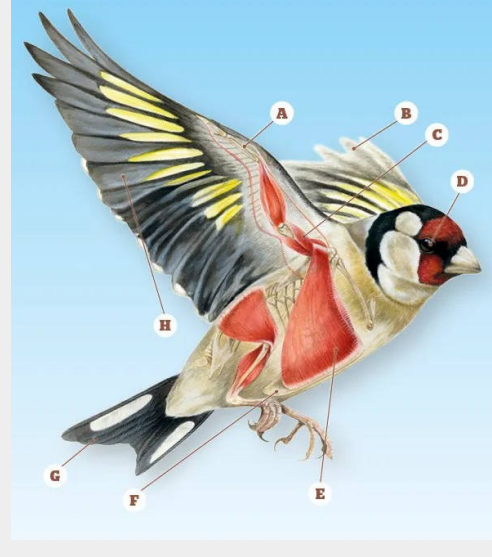
Learned **Homo sapiens: The "great synthesizers" of music**

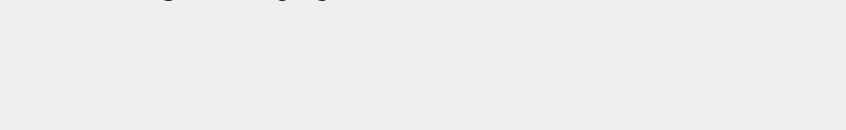
They laugh at us **How do birds fly?**
