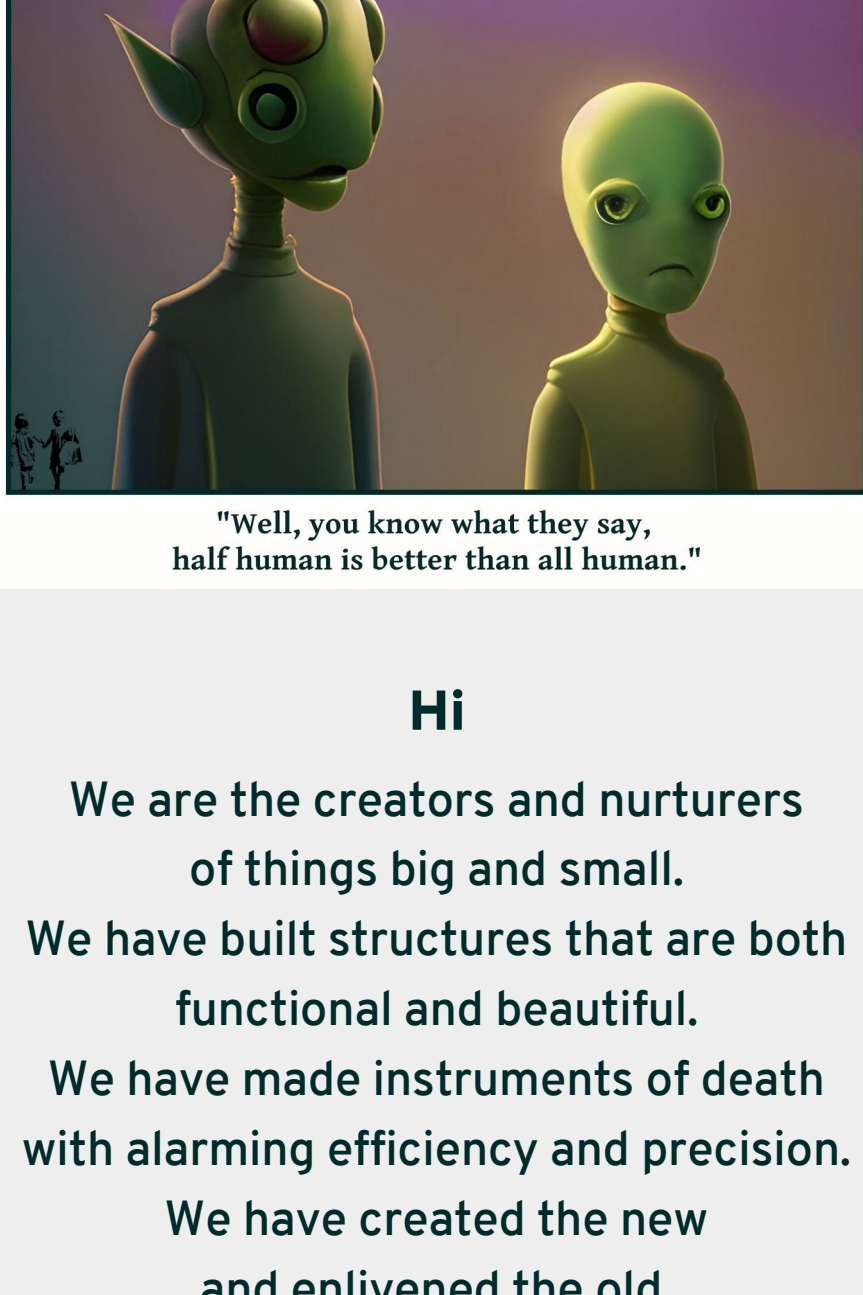

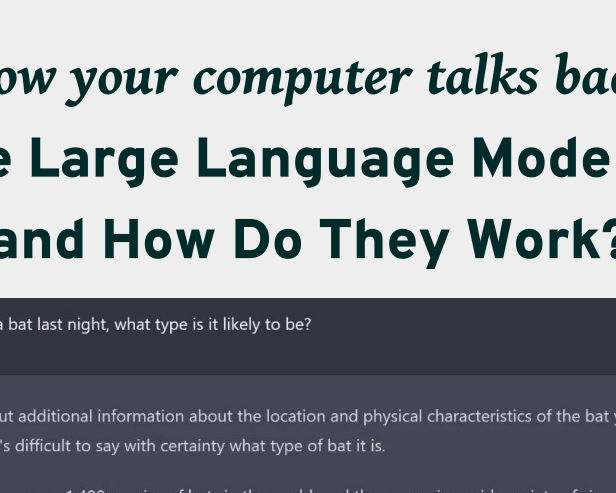

Finding a haystack in a needle You'll Need a Microscope to See These Miniature Masterpieces

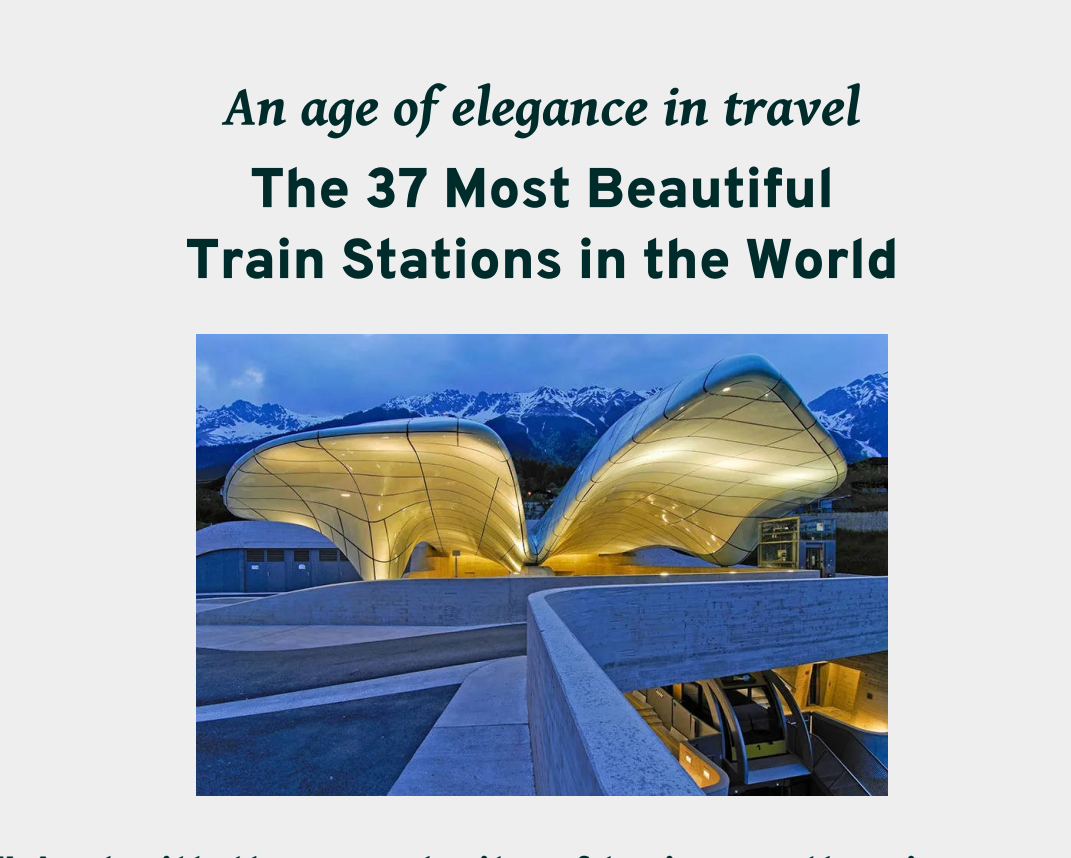


" Artist Willard Wigan is famous for his recreations

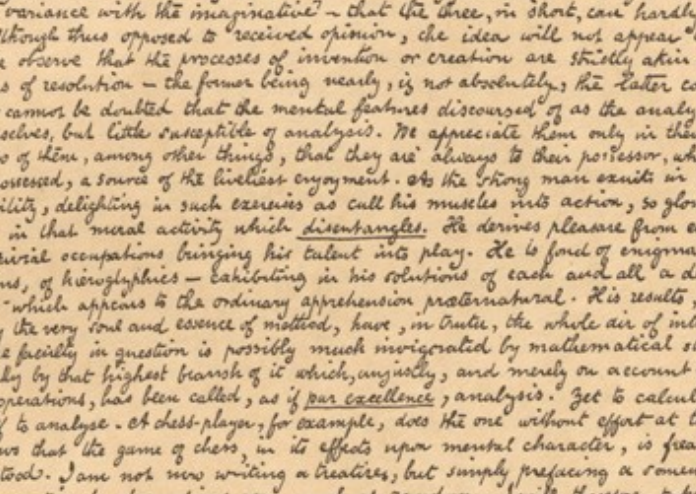
What Are Large Language Models (LLMs) and How Do They Work?



" To generate these responses, LLMs use a
technique called natural language generation
(NLG). This involves examining the input and using
the patterns learned from its data repository to
generate a contextually correct and relevant
response.

But LLMs go deeper than this. They can also tailor
replies to suit the emotional tone of the input.
When combined with contextual understanding,
the two facets are the main drivers that allow
LLMs to create human-like responses. "

An age of elegance in travel The 37 Most Beautiful Train Stations in the World



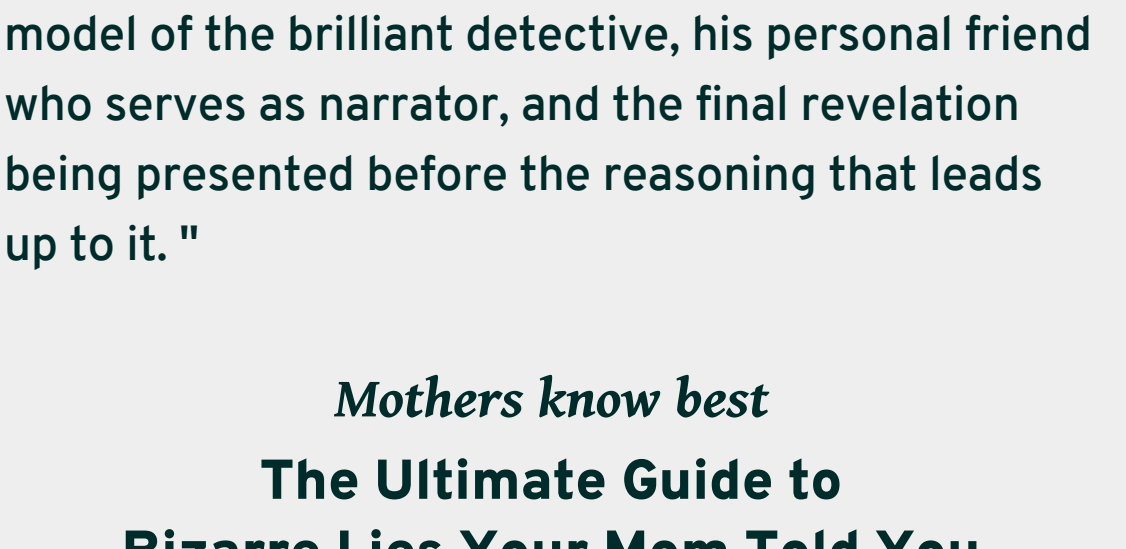
" And with the popularity of trains on the rise

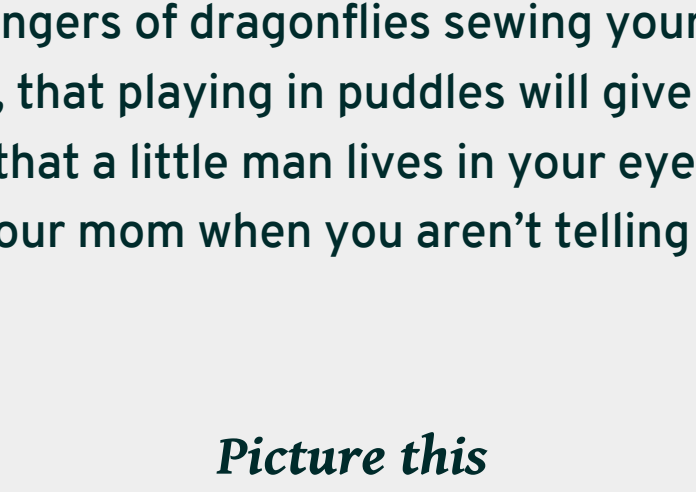
A genre is born

The Ultimate Guide to Bizarre Lies Your Mom Told You

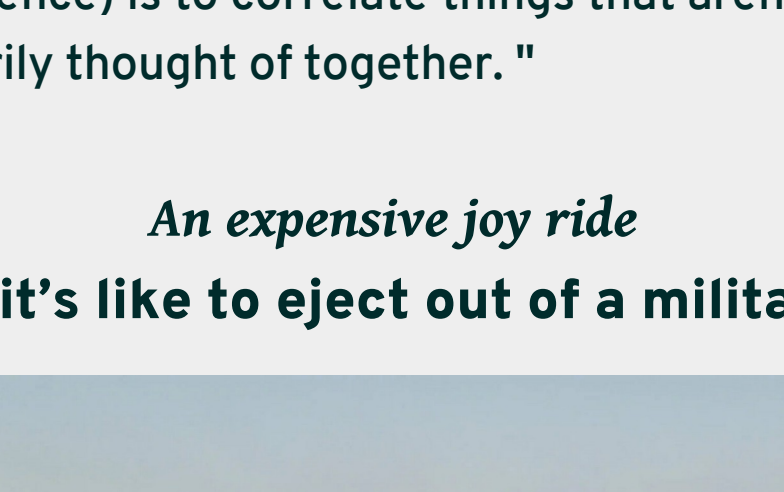


" Many mothers still tell variations on the classics:

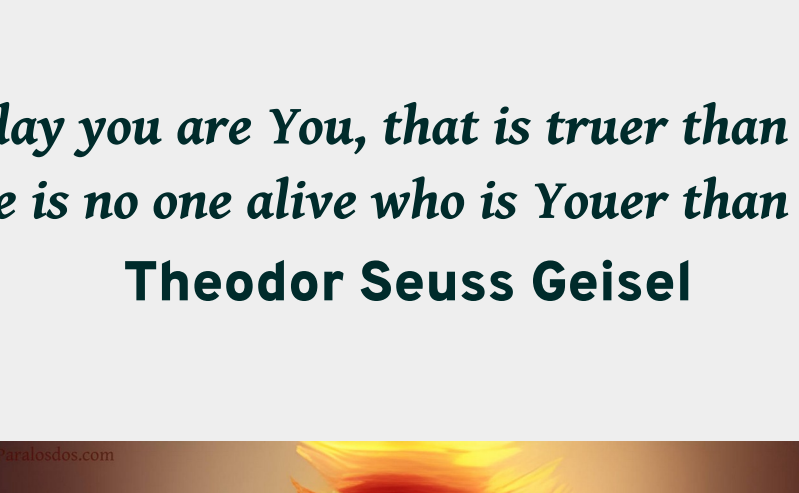
Is your memory struggling? Here are ways to boost your recall

The key insight was learning to think in pictures,
rather than words. And when you think of it, this
makes sense. We are primarily visual creatures
who best remember images, rather than words.
The real challenge for our memory (and
intelligence) is to correlate things that aren't
ordinarily thought of together. "

What it's like to eject out of a military jet



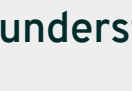
" The 200-lb ejection seat, with its 3,500 or so
parts, is a remarkable piece of technology that not
only gets pilots out of a crashing plane but also
ensures they survive the experience more or less
unscathed. If the pilot ejects above 16,400 feet
where oxygen is scarce, sensors on the chair will
let it free-fall to get its occupant down to
breathable air as fast as possible, and only then
will the parachute open. "
