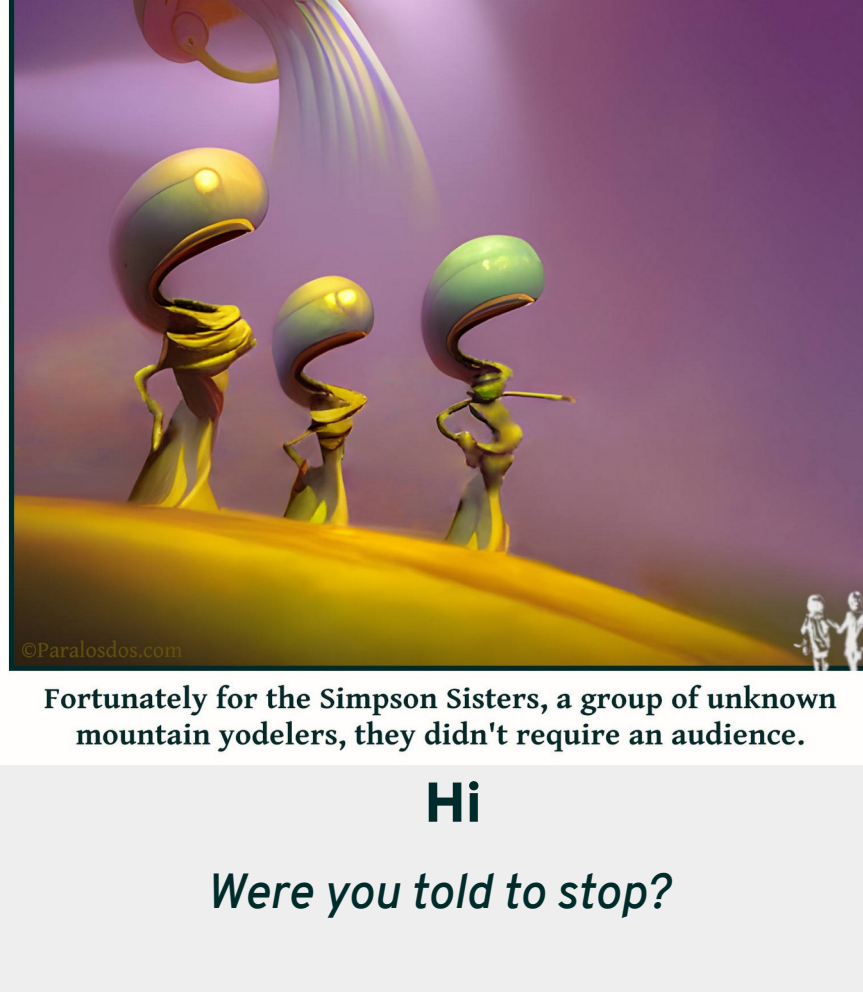

with the passage of time.

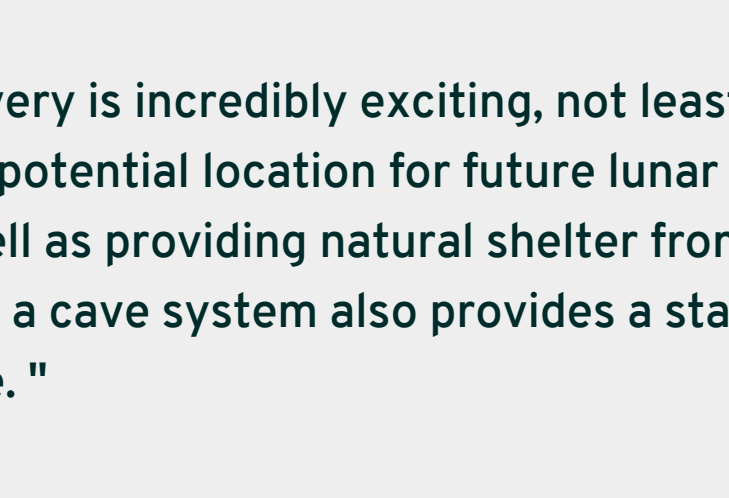
Every kid, of every race, of

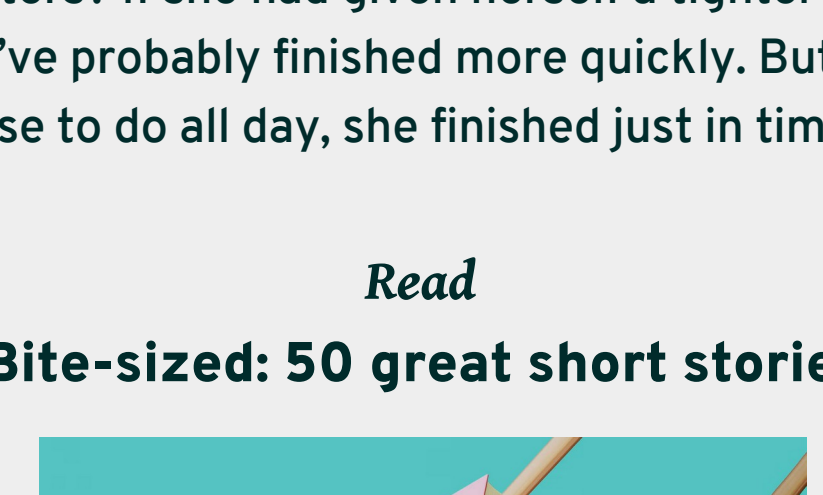
A cave discovered on the Moon opens up new opportunities for settlement

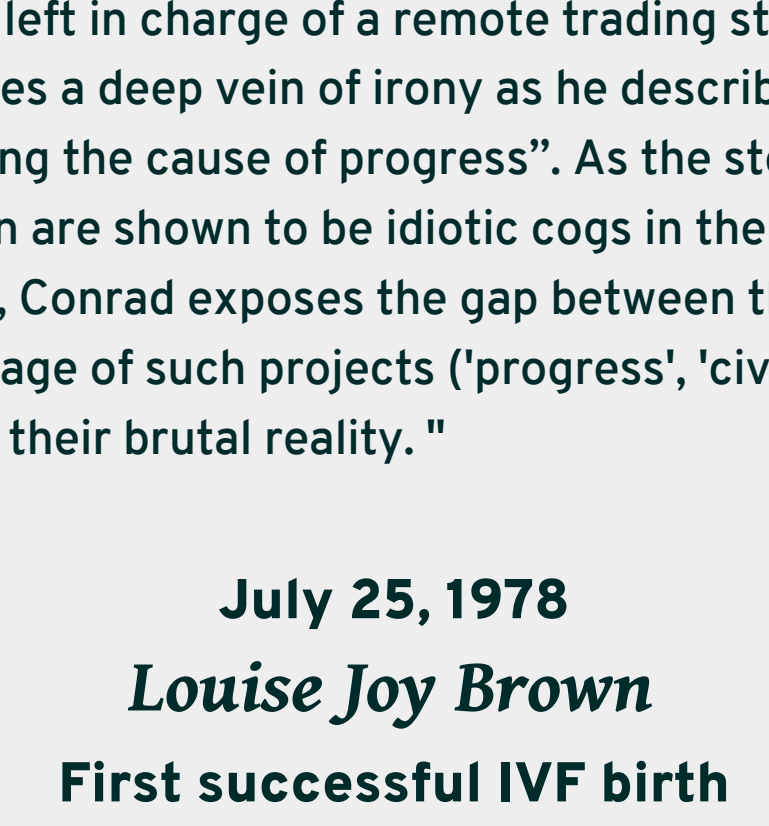

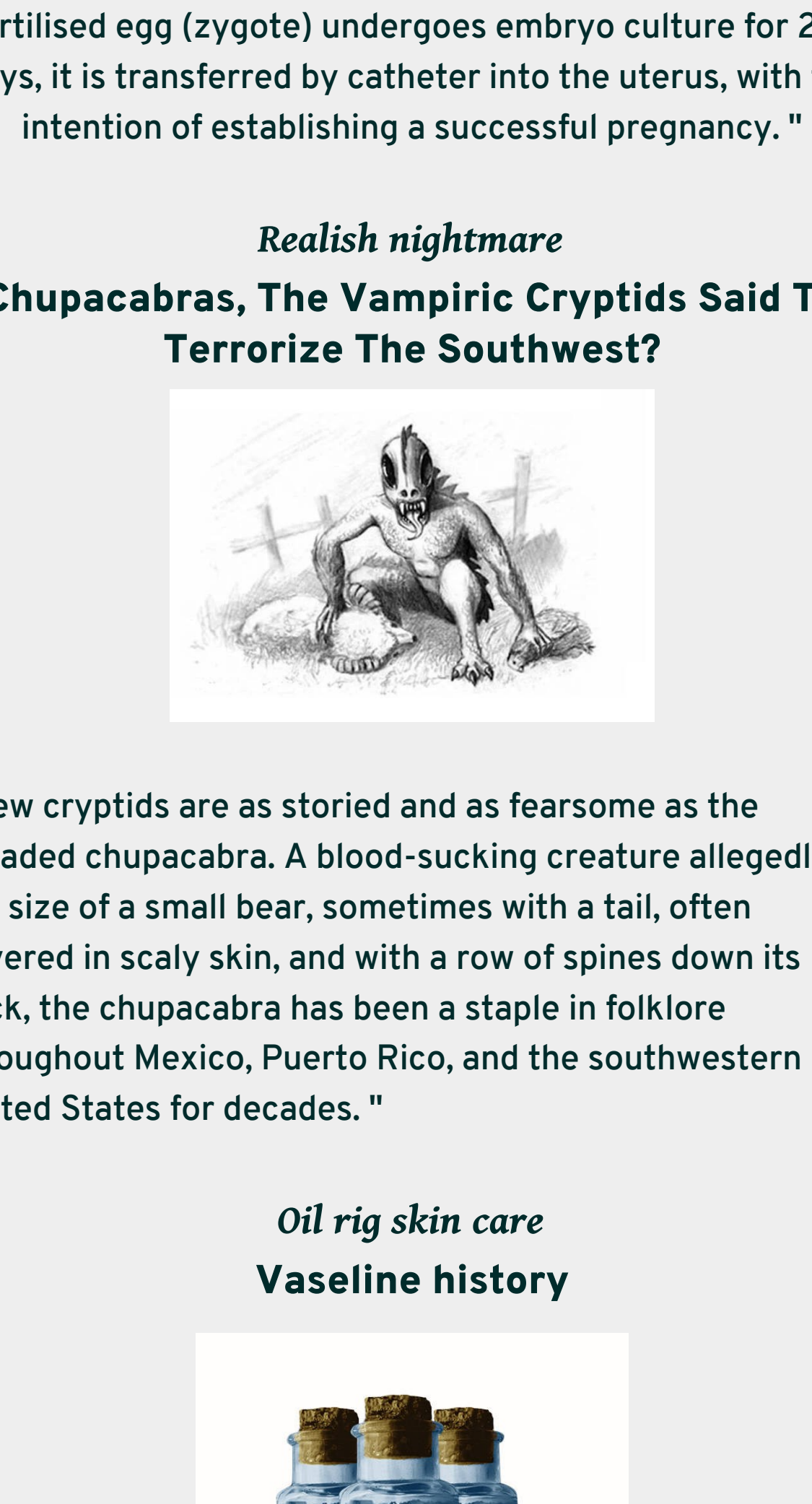
'An Outpost of Progress' by Joseph Conrad (1897)

" Kayerts and Carlier, agents for the Great Trading Company, are 'two perfectly insignificant and incapable individuals' left in charge of a remote trading station. Conrad mines a deep vein of irony as he describes their work "serving the cause of progress". As the story unfolds, and the men are shown to be idiotic cogs in the engine of colonialism, Conrad exposes the gap between the high-flown language of such projects ('progress', 'civilisation', 'virtue') and their brutal reality. "

First successful IVF birth



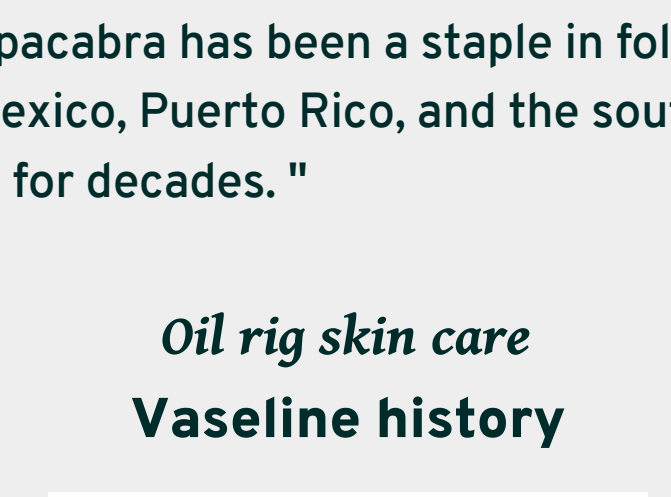

" In vitro fertilisation (IVF) is a process of fertilisation where an egg is combined with sperm in vitro ('in glass').

The process involves monitoring and stimulating a woman's ovulatory process, removing an ovum or ova (egg or eggs) from their ovaries and letting a man's sperm fertilise them in a culture medium in a laboratory. After the fertilised egg (zygote) undergoes embryo culture for 2–6 days, it is transferred by catheter into the uterus, with the intention of establishing a successful pregnancy. "

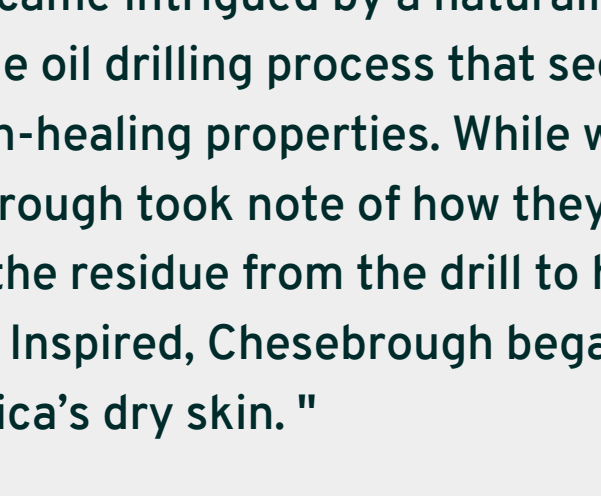
Chupacabras, The Vampiric Cryptids Said To Terrorize The Southwest?

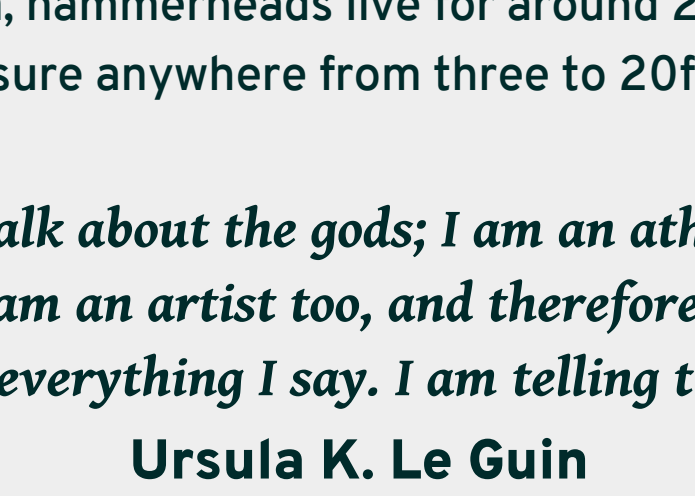

" Robert Augustus Chesebrough, a 22 year-old British chemist, traveled to Titusville, a small Pennsylvania town where petroleum had recently been discovered. Chesebrough, who had been making kerosene from the oil of sperm whales, was eager to learn what other products could be made from petroleum. Shortly after arriving in Titusville he became intrigued by a naturally-occurring byproduct of the oil drilling process that seemed to have remarkable skin-healing properties. While watching the oilmen, Chesebrough took note of how they would smear their skin with the residue from the drill to help heal their cuts and burns. Inspired, Chesebrough began his quest to help heal America's dry skin. "

Weirdest animal contender

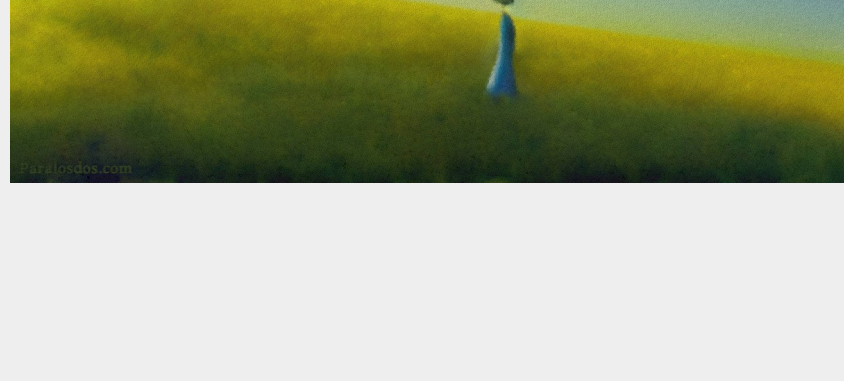
Hammerhead Shark



" Hammerhead sharks are one of the most recognisable ocean creatures and perhaps the most distinctive of all shark species, largely thanks to their strangely-shaped heads - known as a cephalofoil. Found in the warm waters around Central America, Southern America, Africa, Asia, and Australia, hammerheads live for around 20 to 30 years and can measure anywhere from three to 20ft. "
